

Even more advanced Putnam training

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1 Problems

Putnam 1995/B1. For a partition π of $\{1, \dots, 9\}$, let $\pi(x)$ be the number of elements in the part containing x . Prove that for any two partitions π and π' , there are two distinct numbers x and y in $\{1, \dots, 9\}$ such that $\pi(x) = \pi'(y)$ and $\pi'(x) = \pi(y)$. [A *partition* of a set S is a collection of disjoint subsets (parts) whose union is S .]

Putnam 1996/A2. Let C_1 and C_2 be circles whose centers are 10 units apart, and whose radii are 1 and 3. Find, with proof, the locus of all points M for which there exist points X on C_1 and Y on C_2 such that M is the midpoint of the line segment XY .

Putnam 1996/B3. Given that $\{x_1, \dots, x_n\} = \{1, \dots, n\}$, find, with proof, the largest possible value, as a function of n (with $n \geq 2$), of

$$x_1x_2 + x_2x_3 + \cdots + x_{n-1}x_n + x_nx_1.$$
